Dates of Importance

February 27, 1904—The first fireboat to serve the city of Portland would be commissioned. Named the "George Williams," the 105 foot 6 inch steam-driven vessel would protect the city for 23 years before being replaced by more modern craft in 1927.

DCMA Valor Medals

The David Campbell Memorial Association was founded on June 21, 1913 as the "David Campbell Memorial and Medal Fund." Their mission was to manage and expend funds on behalf of public donations for the yet-to-be-built David Campbell Memorial. They also decided to create valor awards for heroic acts by Portland Firefighters.

The Association had no idea when and how this project would take off but less than a year later, they would have to figure it out. On January 29, 1914 a fire would break out in a rooming house at the corner of First and Harrison Streets. The first arriving firefighters were Fire Chief Biddy Dowell along with his driver, Thomas Gavin. A man was trapped upstairs in the building. waiting for other crews to arrive, Gavin found a ladder and placed it against the second floor window and entered the burning building. He would carry a man named O. Eckland from the building, saving his life.

Gavin, who was a firefighter but assigned as an auto mechanic for Portland Fire, came to that position when Fallen Fire Chief David Campbell purchased the first motorized vehicle in 1909, a Pierce Arrow sedan. Automobiles of the day were quite new and it was probably considered best practice to have the auto mechanic also serve as driver. Gavin was that person for Chief Campbell, then later Chief Dowell.

At the 1915 annual service to remember Chief Campbell, Gavin was given a certificate for his effort, promising to award him an actual medal when it was developed. At the 6th anniversary of the death of Chief Campbell, June 26, 1917, Thomas Gavin would receive the first David Campbell Gold Medal for his act of valor. Since that day, only one other gold medal has been awarded (2021).



Welcome to the new Commissioners
